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

TRADITIONS CHECKLIST—from the A.A. Grapevine
These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in
conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in
November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were
originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have
since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Checklist:

The Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness.

Short Form:

The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of over-all policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, 2 exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities.

9.

Short Form:

Good service leadership at all levels is indispensable for our future functioning and safety. Primary world service leadership, once exercised by the founders, must necessarily be assumed by the trustees.



The Origin of John Barleycorn...

In early English folklore, John Barleycorn is personified as a character who represents the crop of barley harvested each autumn and as the grain from which malt liquor is made. In the traditional folksong, John Barleycorn, the character of John Barleycorn endures all kinds of indignities, most of which correspond to the cyclic nature of planting, growing, harvesting, and then death.

Early versions from 1568 and 1725 about a farcical ballad of the attempt to assassinate Sir John Barleycorn, only to have




There was three kings into the east, Three kings both great and high, And they hae sworn a solemn oath John Barleycorn should die.

The name also appears in the title of Jack London's biography, John Barleycorn: Alcoholic Memoirs. Published in 1913, this harrowing, autobiographical 'A to Z' of drinking shattered London's reputation as a clean-living adventurer and massively successful author of such books as White Fang and The Call of the Wild.

John Barleycorn is mentioned in the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions Step One (p.24) - "John Barleycorn himself had become our best advocate." Step Two (p.29) - "But again John Barleycorn had other ideas."

<u>UNITY-GOD*YOU*ME</u>

3 is the magic number! A braid of three is not easily broken. Let's look at the program of Alcoholics Anonymous. Steps one through three can be broken down into three concepts: I can't, He can, let Him. The 12 Steps summarize into three phrases: trust God, clean house, help others. The 3 Essentials: honesty, open-mindedness, willingness. Of course ourselves is made up of three: mind, body, spirit. Then the solutions are three elements: Recovery, Unity, Service.

🌋 Let's talk about Unity. This is a WE program. The first word of the first step is WE. All of the remaining steps have an implied We in front of them as well. This is also a WEEEE! process. For it's a roller coaster ride that we strapped in for when we first start this journey of sobriety.

When I first thought of WE, I contemplated on you and me. But the more I reflected on that idea, it didn't work. It just wasn't enough. There had to be a Divine third party. We needed to invite God into the picture. Now there is a Power, strength and direction. This is the first word of the first step, and insinuates a Higher Power. Without this simple, single element, involved right from the get-go, we are lost.

* "We had to find a power by which we could live, and it had to be a Power greater than ourselves. Obviously. But where and how were we to find this Power?

Well, that's exactly what this book is about."

So the unity of 3 is: **God, you a** love. Where love is, God is also. So the unity of 3 is: God, you and me. Where two or more gather together in my name, there I will be in the Mist. Since God is

love. Where love is, God is also.

The practice of Loving God (trust God), Loving myself (cleaning house) and Loving others (help others) sums up the necessity of having unity with Higher Power, ourselves and others. The WE is such a simple, yet under appreciated word and notion. The big book was written in the WE form, but it wasn't just written by Alcoholics. A Higher Power was guiding, for sure. Good orderly direction every step of the way.





Grey areas persist in Alcoholics Anonymous. Areas where no clear cut answer is good for everyone and where each individual is free to have their own experience. How fast should I go through the steps? What kind of sponsorship is "good"? What constitutes a "solid" meeting?

The reason for traditions is to guide an AA group and its members through sobriety with lessons our predecessors had to learn through their own painful experience. Not following traditions is not punishable by expulsion from AA, but are proven guideposts to align members with what is best to preserve the future of Alcoholics Anonymous, the integrity of the group, and the humility of the members.

Tradition Eight states "Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional, but our service centers may employ special workers", and is needed more than ever in this era of spin dry rehabs and money hungry centers, blurring the lines of recovery and treatment. Our own co-founder, Bill W., was tempted to 12 step work for hire at a well-respected hospital. The lure was so appealing that his own conscience used the scripture "the laborer is worthy of his hire" to justify taking the position. But while his own conscience only saw the benefit, the group conscience was able to see the pitfalls and helped Bill see where our spiritual footwork must be done for fun and for free.

On one hand, it makes sense that we be used to help self-destructive people. We are experts on that subject. Most of us have ruined our own lives and many others with our drinking, our inconsiderate actions, and our darkness. Who better to reach those still lost? Adding the fact that a new and wonderful life is available through working the 12 steps, any reasonable person would assume that recovered alcoholics were made to be professional twelve steppers.

On the other hand, an alcoholic suffers from a spiritual sickness based in selfishness. The driving force for an alcoholic has always been about personal gain and ego boosting. Sure, thinks the alcoholic, helping someone out is a nice thing to do...as long as I get something to show for it. This mindset can be a death nail in relation to 12 step work. The power needed to achieve and retain continued must be a Power greater than that of material or human form. Therefore, the motives for why an alcoholic would help another struggling alcoholic cannot be based on any monetary compensation or else the integrity of the process will come into question. Very rarely do spirituality and money make a winning combination. More often than not, the outcome is based on either personal achievement at another persons expense, or compensation for personal gain. If we of Alcoholics Anonymous are to be carrying out the will of a Higher Power by trying to help His lost and dying children, no price tag can morally or ethically be put on that effort.

I have come to define spirituality as: the manner in which something is done. When we can reach out to someone in the spirit of love, consideration and helpfulness, we are strengthening our relationship with a Higher Power and helping to lay the groundwork for someone else's journey toward a fulfilling life. If, however, we reach out to those dying of alcoholism with our hands out for recompense, the fruit of our labor will be bitter indeed.

When it comes to professional duties needing to be done so that Alcoholics Anonymous can continue it's primary purpose, the distinction between avocation and vocation is very clear. While actual 12 step work is a very personal and intimate endeavor, the responsibilities which make that work possible are large scale and business oriented. Our organization could not possibly exist unless an army of capable people were available to make it happen. Accountants are needed to count donations, office personal are needed to answer inquiries, printers are needed to make literature available etc...

Is a worldwide organization expected to run itself with competence on purely volunteer effort? Are the special abilities needed to make Alcoholics Anonymous work at a corporate level expected to be completed by those who are independently wealthy or unemployed?

If someone has a knack for certain duties or tasks, and can perform them with more competency than most, it would be arrogant and selfish of us as a group to not let those people share those talents for fair compensation. Tradition 8 applies to actual 12 step work, not the practices which allow the work to be done.

For me, the most important reason why Tradition 8 is so vital to an alcoholic is very simple, I have known several people who have gotten drunk or killed themselves as a result of blurring the lines between working in treatment and living in recovery. It deeply pains me to watch wonderful people crash and burn when their own spiritual/mental/physical/emotional well-being takes a back seat to their job at a rehabilitation facility. Priorities will undoubtedly shift when focus in taken off who God wants us to be, and placed on our next paycheck. We are not still thriving as a fellowship because Ebby visited Bill and then charged a consultation fee. We are not still thriving Bill sat with Dr. Bob, then billed his insurance. We are still thriving, growing, laughing, relating, caring and healing because one alcoholic who has had a profound change of heart and mind can reach a still suffering alcoholic the way no doctor, therapist, case manager or relative can.

It will cost you time and gas money to go visit detox or sit down for step work, but you will leave sober and grateful. It will cost you convenience and energy to sit with someone freshly sober and untreated, but you will stay sober with the reminder of desperation.

Alcoholics Anonymous saved my life when I didn't think my life was worth saving. It is my duty to give back my hope, my time, my energy to that person with tombstones in their eyes...for fun and for free.
