





A. A.'s Learn All Alcohol Is Poison to the Alcoholic Beer, Wine and Hard Liquor Found Equally Dangerous by Experience

This is the third article of a series on Alcoholics Anonymous, national brotherhood of recov-ered alcoholics.

By ROBERT A. ERWIN. When a confirmed heavy drinker goes on a binge, ultimately he causes more trouble to his doctor than any one else but himself and his own family. The medical pro-fessionl long has recognized alco-holism as a disease and has been unrelenting in efforts to help con-quer it.

The same was true for former pa-tients at other institutions.

tients at other institutions. Meetings "Prescribed." A doctor who specializes in alco-holics Anonymous, and, at his sug-gestion, many of his patients have attended meetings of the group and become guite active in helping vic-tims of strong drink to overcome the disease.

The A. As and their doctor friend have concurred that alcohol in any form is poison to an alcoholic. "For the alcoholic, beer, wine or liquor are all equally dangerous," the doctor told them. "The name of the beverage is unimportant. It is the fact that they all contain alcohol in some degree." "This same noist was driven horse

In some degree." This same point was driven horse by an active member who often has presided at Washington chapter

by an active member who often has presided at Washington chapter meetings. "I went to the home of a friend," recalled the speaker, a former sales-man and gentleman farmer. "This friend knew I was suffering from alcoholism. He did not know better, however, than to offer me some ale. Now. I have some friends who have tomato juice for me when I go to their homes, and I really appreciate that.

Realizes Danger.

Realizes Danger. "Anyhow," he continued. "this aforementioned friend's wife later came out on the porch and ex-claimed: "Do let me get you a nice cold bottle of ale." Then it popped into my mind—I had drunk two bottles of beer the week before, and I rationalized that I could drink two more. I did, and it wasn't long be-fore I was heading for a bright elec-tric sign—a sign over a tavern— down the street. "I realized ultimately that if I continued I was headed for a binge. I telephoned a friend who was an alcoholic. He said he was in a ter-rible state of mind. I went to see him and to help him, and after a short time I left there without the desire to drink. No." he concluded with emphasis, "this beer experiment won't work." One doctor who has written of the

won't work.

One doctor who has written of the One doctor who has written of the Alcoholics Anonymous movement is Dr. W. D. Silkworth. New York, whose article was printed in The Journal-Lancet of Minneapolis, Minn. in July, 1939. "These ex-alcoholics frequently find that unless they spend time in

helping others to health they can-not stay sober themselves." he said. "Strenuous, almost sacrificial work for other sufferers is often impera-tive in the early days of their re-covery. This effort proceeds en-tirely on a good-will basis. It is an avocation. " " The conscious search of these alcoholics for the right answer has enabled them to find an approach which has been effectual in something like half of all the cases upon which it has been tried. This is a truly remarkable record when it is remembered that most of them were undoubtedly beyond the reach of other remedial measures."

Then I had started drinking sgain.

Anything that smacked of religion sounded like rules to me," Mr. X continued, "and if you don't follow them you're out of the club. The first meeting I attended some one walked up and said. 'Hello, rummy.' That appealed to my sense of humor. As for religion, I found I could suit myself about that. Now, I am con-vinced that religion is the corner-stone of the whole thing.

"You have got to want not to drink," he said. "With me, it was a gradual process. Some of us, of a gradual process, some of us, of course, have got all fired up with this thing right away and have slayed quit. As for religion, I have a simple faith, and as you know, we have no connection with any par-ticular ensure ticular group.

Must Make Amends. At this point, Mr. X took up two points in the 12 steps that a con-firmed drunkard follows to become a working member of Alcoholics Anonymous. They are: 'To make a list of all persons we had harmed and become willing to make amends to them all and "to make direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others'

"If you go to a chap you have wronged, when he thinks you are a heel," Mr. X pointed out, "and if wronged, when he minks you are a heel," Mr. X pointed out, "and if he still thinks so when you leave, you've lost nothing. You can't quit alcohol or anything else if something billion out and state of the something is biting you I admitted my wrongs and it was like a spring house-cleaning. Turning From Drink Requires Honesty With Self

Alcoholics Anonymous Member Says Thesis Is First Reform Step

(No. 4 of a Series.)

An alcoholic must be honest with himself before he can have any hope of recovery. This is one of the primary theses on which the organization of Alcoholics Anonymous is based and on which much of the organization's success has been attained.

Putting this into practice, numerous members have recounted their individual case histories before their prothers and sisters in the Washington A. A. chapter.

One interesting case is that of young Mr. X. He is an attorney in a Federal bureau. When his days work at his own desk is done he takes up his avocation of helping rummies on the same road to recov-ery that he has traveled.

A False Pride. "It's false pride," he affirmed. "If you don't admit that Old John Bar-I admitted that did I stop drinking. A friend gave me a copy of the book, 'Alcoholics Anonymous.' At the time I had not been drinking for a month, but I was not very happy. I had just spent two months in a "goony roost." That's one of our names for an institution for alcohol-

Alcoholism is a serious problem

Alcoholism has been described as the condition of those whose excessive drinking creates serious problems in the management of their lives and yet who are usually unable to stop drinking permanently, even if the want to, without outside help. THREE TRAITS are usually found here: exces-

THREE TRAITS are usually found here: excessive drinking over a period of time, serious life problems caused by or connected with drinking, and sometimes even such a compulsion to drink that a person cannot stop drinking without the help of others.

Despite the fact that the number of men who are alcoholics runs into the millions here in the United States, there is no great amount of sympathy for this problem among the general public

Many individuals think alcoholism is simply caused by excessive and prolonged drinking. Experts tell us that this is not so in most cases of true alcoholism. It seems to be a disease in a fairly large percentage of cases.

Psychiatrists point out that because alcohol affords a means of escape or is a personality crutch, neurotics often seek in it a temporary escape from insecurity and frustration. But there is a vicious circle here. The neurotic does not find a solution in alcohol nor a means of escape from the conflicts of everyday life, so even more frustrated and then tortured by guilt feelings, he seeks to drown his sorrows in more alcohol.

THE FIRST STEP in dealing with a real alcoholic is medical, the second, psychological. It is in the second step that Alcoholics Anonymous has been so effective because it acknowledges that the solution is not only to stop drinking, but to rehabilitate and reeducate the individual so he will not turn to drink in the future.

Another contribution of AA is its recognition and employment of religious principles. A number of its famous 12 steps concern themselves with getting the individual to admit he has no defense against drink and that he must depend upon a Higher Power.

The principles and experience of AA have been confirmed by the opinions of many psychiatrists. Catholic and non-Catholic alike. It is their view that the recovery of an alcoholic is hardly possible without the help of religion.

OUR CATHOLIC FAITH can point out here the basic religious motives for changing one's ways. It shows the victim of alcoholism his true purpose in life, the necessity of trust in God, and the spiritual strength that is available from grace and confidence in divine power.

The Church has dealt with human weaknesses always. So she reminds the alcoholic that after the immediate cure there will still be temptation, that he must avoid the causes of his problem insofar as he can, and he must pray to God daily for the strength to stay sober — at least for 24 hours.

These thoughts are most apropos in light of the dedication last Sunday of the Good Samaritan Inn, the diocesan facility for the rehabilitation of those afflicted with alcoholism.

It is in keeping with the tradition of the Church and her concern for those beset with physical, mental, emotional and spiritual weakness. It is particularly noteworthy that this is the first such facility, under diocesan auspices, in the United States. It provides a residence for 75 men.

Surveys indicate that there are only half as many women as men who are alcoholics in this country. But a prominent expert in this field recently stated that this statistic is misleading. He believes there are just as many women afflicted with this problem, only most are hidden or secret drinkers. They usually drink at home and are protected, unwisely, by family and friends. We say "unwisely" because they will go for years without facing the reality that they have a real serious problem.

OUR DIOCESE has taken the lead in this matter too. Since 1954 the Sisters of the Good Shepherd have provided a residence for women who are seeking recovery from the alcoholic problem. Maryhaven at the Convent of the Good Shepherd has been a true haven for many women.

Meetings of groups of both men and women interested in helping the alcoholic will be held at the new Good Samaritan Inn as they have been at Maryhaven.

All of us should be concerned with this evergrowing menace to individual and community welfare. We can help not only by showing interest and support for these facilities but by trying to promote the following points advanced by Dr. Marvin Block (Family Weekly, 8-5-61):

1. The public should be educated to the fact that drunkenness in any form is not laughable.

2. People should never be encouraged to drink freely as if it were completely harmless.

3. The impression should be destroyed that ability to handle liquor is a sign of manliness in men and feminine poise in women.

 Children should be taught the potential danger of alcohol.

5. Everyone must face the fact that in dealing with any vice, one does not succeed every time and that fresh starts must be made in keeping with individual limitations.

It is an age-old lesson. In any moral problem, we should confess our powerlessness to God, surrender ourself into His keeping, and try to accept whatever sacrifices He asks of us. This prepares the ground for grace. — GAF
