DELEGATE'S REPORT: AREA 09 ASSEMBLY JANUARY 10, 2010

Good afternoon!

Several people have asked me if I'm ready to be Delegate. My answer is the same to everyone: I heard an interview several years ago with the then newly appointed president of Princeton University. She was, as a matter of fact, the first woman president of that prestigious institution. I have served the area as a GSR, District secretary, DCM, DCMC, Area Treasurer and Registrar, member of the Finance Committee, Grapevine Committee Chair and most recently as the chair of the newly formed Area Communications Committee.

FROM THE DECEMBER AA WORLD SERVICE BOARD MEETING:

- Some of you were aware that GSO computer system was the recipient of a **random**, **virus-related intrusion** that seriously impacted their operations and servers. The office system was completely restored and there was no loss of GSO records or data.
- Much focus was on the upcoming 75th Anniversary of AA International Convention in San Antonio this year and the 21st World Service meeting in Mexico.
- The GSO Corrections desk needs volunteer for the Corrections Correspondence Service. In particular, Spanish-speaking males who live *outside the Pacific Region*. (Do you know anyone outside our Area who could be contacted about this?) Also mentioned was an inmate who is corresponding with an entire AA Group...perhaps an idea for your home group to consider.
- New stories are being sought for a revision of the pamphlet "It Sure Beats Sitting in a Cell". Stories can be sent to the Corrections desk at GSO or given to the chair of our Corrections committee for submission. Also, local Corrections committees

mittee for submission. Also, local Corrections committees are being asked to share experience with the signing of legally binding documents as part of their cooperation with the corrections professionals. Local solutions regarding how to observe facility regulations while staying within our Traditions are needed and can also be sent to GSO given to the Chair of our Corrections Committee.

- Foreign Services Desk GSO Staff person, Warren S. attended the French-speaking African Service Meeting in Cameroon in November.
- Treatment Facilities and H&I committees are asked to share any experience that they may have had with carrying the message to treatment professionals and clients in **outpatient settings**.
- Special Needs committees are asked to share any suggestions regarding developing a poster depicting alcoholics with special needs, such as suggestions about what such a poster might include, as well as how such a poster might be used if it is developed.
- Publications Report:
 - Total distribution of books was up 5.9% from the same period the year before.
 - o 24% of the total book sales were to non-AAs in 2009.
 - o In 2008 only 19% of books sold were to non-AAs.
 - o Big Book gross sales through November 2009 were approximately \$13,000,000.
- A catalog of products available from AA was mailed with the Holiday issue of Box 459.
- The "Young People's Video" DVD, which we viewed at the last area service committee meeting was mailed to all conference members in December.

Not quite like Literature, which will consider a new pamphlet on Spirituality, or Finance who will discuss whether we should continue to use book sales to fund AA services.

- However, I am actually very excited about this assignment. For one thing it is the first time a delegate from our area has served on this committee...and, we will be considering themes, workshops, discussion and workshop topics for the 2011 conference, as well as reviewing the conference evaluation forms...maybe I can pick up some ideas for an assembly evaluation form!
- In addition, I have been assigned to the Archives Committee, which will probably only meet once, with the Trustees Archives Committee, in order to review the Archives workbook and discuss the possibility of a PowerPoint virtual tour of the GSO archives.
- I will, of course, want to and try to be informed (with your help) on all the conference agenda items, as I will want to know whether the various committee recommendations are in line with your thinking before voting for or against any particular action. I have selected a few of the **preliminary items** and a list of **suggested discussion topics** based on the conference theme for your use at you District and your Group; I put them on the literature table.
- PRE-CONFERENCE ASSEMBLY: We will have a preconference assembly where you will help me evaluate the various items and let me know your ideas, suggestions and opinions.
 We have sent the preliminary conference agenda items to all the
 area members whose email addresses are known to us. We will
