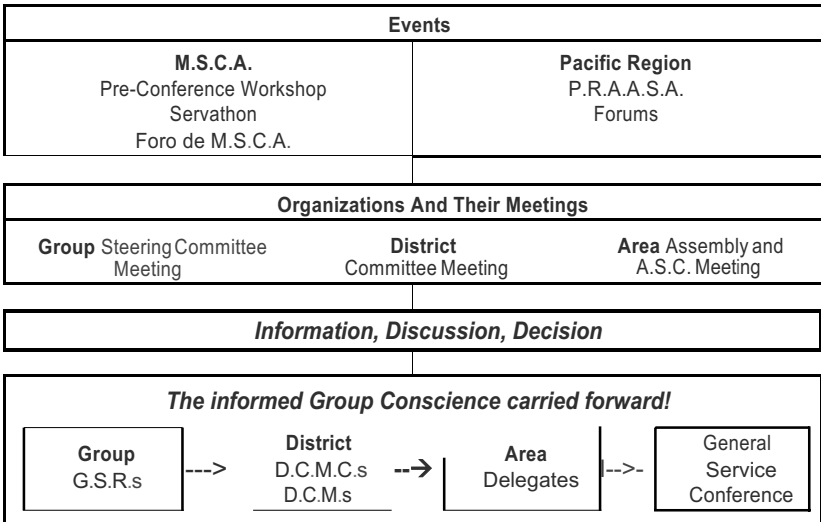

SERVICE MEETINGS

During your term as a G.S.R. you will be attending a number of District and Area meetings. Your first General Service meeting will be a lot like your first A.A. meeting . . . confusing. However, it has been found that continued attendance at service meetings and the study of available literature, such as *The A.A. Service Manual*, will clear up this confusion and service will quickly become very rewarding. You should find your Service Sponsor helpful. If you don't have one, ask your D.C.M. and D.C.M.C. about service questions. If you don't know who and what these people are, you soon will.

An Informed Group Conscience



An informed G.S.R. keeps A.A. alive and well!

By attending meetings and expressing your Group Conscience you are helping to keep A.A. strong and pass that strength along to future members. Attending Service meetings is as important to the life of A.A. as attending Group meetings is to your life in recovery.

Group Steering Committee Meetings

Many Groups have Steering Committee or business meetings which conduct routine business matters and report back to the Group. Upon occasion the Group votes to express its Group Conscience on A.A. matters. The G.S.R. carries the results of the Group Conscience to the District and Area meetings.

Districts hold meetings for G.S.R.s where you will learn about your District. In this way Groups are able to communicate with each other. At these meetings you will become informed of items to be discussed at the Assembly so that you will be prepared to take part.

Area Service Committee (A.S.C.) Meetings

Issues to be decided at Assemblies are first introduced at Area Service Committee (A.S.C.) meetings so D.C.M.C.s and D.C.M.s can bring them to their District meetings for discussion with G.S.R.s. The G.S.R.s take the issues to their Groups and bring back their Group Conscience to the next District meeting. The District consciences are brought to the A.S.C. meeting. Discussion and voting takes place. If approved, the issue can be taken to the Assembly.

OTHER SERVICE MEETINGS

Open to All A.A. Members

Pre-Conference Workshop. Provides Group information to the Delegate prior to the General Service Conference in New York. Informs the G.S.R.s, officers, and others present about issues of concern at the forthcoming Conference. Held in the spring of the year.

Servathon. Focuses on one or more of the Twelve Traditions and all aspects of A.A. service work. Held in the fall of the year.

Foro de A.M.S.C. The growth of the Spanish-speaking population and membership in Alcoholics Anonymous in the Mid-Southern California Area has brought opportunities for all members to become active in General Service work. The Foro del A.M.S.C. has been established to afford another means for all A.A. members to participate in the mainstream of Alcoholics Anonymous service. The purpose of the Foro del A.M.S.C. is to focus on General Service topics. It is held yearly in the summer and is attended by members from all communities, Groups and Districts throughout the Area.

P.R.A.A.S.A. (Pacific Region Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly). A Pacific Region-wide Assembly to discuss A.A. issues and matters. For the first time newly elected Delegates meet with and learn from Delegates who have been serving for a year. This Assembly also provides an opportunity for G.S.R.s, and District and Area officers to pool their information and share their views on issues to be discussed at the Conference. Areas bid to host the event.

Forums. Regional Forums are sponsored by the General Service Office in cooperation with the Delegates of the Region and are held every other year—each time in a different Area. They are attended by the Regional Trustees, the Delegates, Past Trustees, several members of the General Service Board of Trustees, G.S.O. staff workers and members of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the AA Grapevine. The purpose is to bring the General Service Office to you. The Forum acquaints G.S.R.s and other service-interested members in the Region with the activities, accomplishments and plans of the service personnel associated with the General Service Conference and—equally important—keeps G.S.O. informed of grass roots sentiments and opinions in the Region.

General Service Conference. We have talked a lot about the Group Conscience-because you, as G.S.R., are the custodian of that Group Conscience. The thoughts and opinions expressed in Group Consciences are pooled at the District meetings you will be attending, and pooled again at the Area Assemblies. The A.A. Group conscience finally comes to a focus-for one long week each spring-at the General Service Conference. Our Delegate carries our M.S.C.A. Group Conscience, along with the Right of Decision, when attending the Conference. The Conference is A.A.'s way of keeping our Fellowship strong and healthy by looking for weaknesses to be corrected and new challenges to be met.

SERVICE STRUCTURE

This pamphlet describes the Mid-Southern California Area Service structure. The Area is the part of Alcoholics Anonymous service in which you personally will be most involved. It is in the Pacific Region. There are 93 Areas in the Conference, 79 in the United States and 14 in Canada. We fit into the overall A.A. Service structure as described below.

Mid-Southern California Area

The Area is divided into 24 Districts with each District being served by an elected District Committee Member Chair (D.C.M.C.), or District Committee Member (D.C.M.) in the Spanish-speaking Districts. In 2019 there were 2,317 A.A. Groups and 69,783 members reported in the Area. In that year, the M.S.C.A. was the largest Area in A.A. membership and largest in number of A.A. Groups in the Conference. The M.S.C.A. was tied for 77th in per capita group contributions (\$3.20) and fifth largest in total Area contributions (\$223,271.33).

With the rapid growth in numbers of A.A. members and A.A. Groups in the M.S.C.A., it was necessary to add the D.C.M.C. position in English-speaking Districts to maintain the integrity of the original Districts without interfering with effective communications between the A.A. Groups (through their G.S.R.s) and the District Committee Member (D.C.M.). D.C.M.s serve Subdistricts within Districts. Spanish-Speaking Districts do not use the Subdistrict structure; their District leaders are D.C.M.s.

Spanish-Speaking Area Structure

The Mid-Southern California Area has one of the largest Spanish-speaking populations in the Conference. The Area's Spanish-speaking structure is expanding to accommodate the growth of this community in A.A. and in the Area. District numbers 20 to 29 have been reserved for this growth. There are six Spanish-speaking Districts that cover the entire Mid-Southern California Area. (See P.12.)

AREA ASSEMBLY

The M.S.C.A. Assembly has seven officers (Executive Committee) including the Delegate. They are elected during odd-numbered years. They serve two-year terms beginning January 1 of even-numbered years. The Executive Committee subject to confirmation by the Assembly appoints replacements for vacancies.

ELECTION ASSEMBLY

In October of odd-numbered years, you will perform one of your most important functions as a G.S.R. by taking part in electing a Delegate from the Mid-Southern California Area as our representative to the General Service Conference. Other Area Officers will also be elected.

Eligibility to Office

The number of Assembly members who are eligible to office is quite large. This gives the Assembly a good field from which to choose the Area officers. Each eligible member must state if they wish to stand for election. Included in those eligible to Area office are: 24 District leaders and any alternates; D.C.M.s of the subdistricts; numerous District officers; six of the Area officers (not Delegates or Past Delegates) all English and Spanish-speaking Standing Committee Cochairs; and 16 Chairs or Directors of Coordinate Committees.

Elections

The Assembly in October of odd-numbered years elects seven Area officers. The Assembly in January elects all English and Spanish-speaking Standing Committee Co-chairs; (Some committees elect their own Chairs.)

Third Legacy Procedure

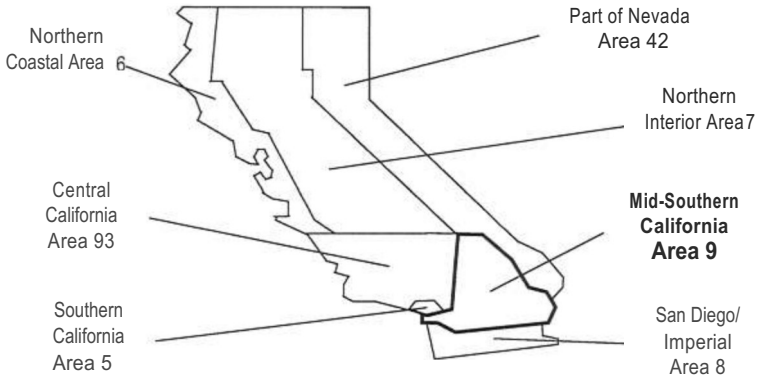
The Third Legacy procedure used to elect the seven M.S. CA officers is considered unique with AA The names of all eligible candidates---except those who state they are unable to serve---are posted on a board. Written ballots are used to vote. The first candidate to receive two-thirds of the total vote is elected. If no candidate receives that vote, lots are drawn from a hat to determine the winner. The balloting sequence is shown below. All actions for each ballot are listed in separate boxes. Action statements in bold italics, information items identified with bullets(•).

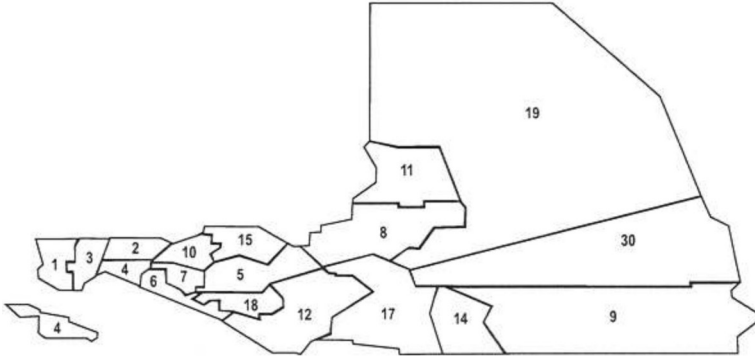

California Areas

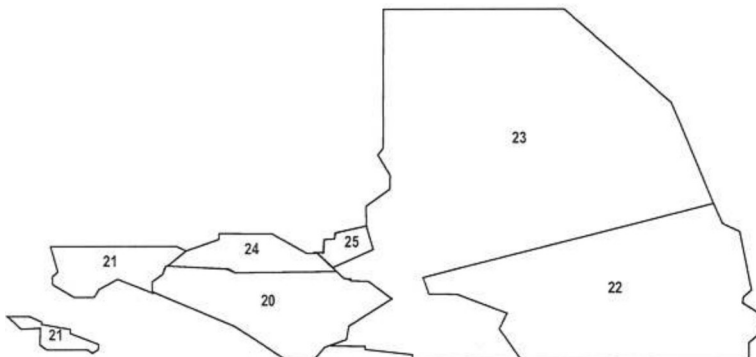


M.S.C.A. English-Speaking Districts
